### **And Expected Reopening Dates**

As more cities, states and counties issue and revise emergency orders to stop the spread of COVID-19, the International Sign Association is working to help sign, graphics and visual communications companies nationwide assess and understand the implications of these orders and emphasize the essential role of our industry.

The following resource is intended as a snapshot to help navigate this rapidly-changing environment. Please consult with regulators within the appropriate jurisdiction and your own stakeholders including legal counsel before making a determination on how to best proceed with your company's operations.

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## **Federal CISA (Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency) Guidance**

*Note: The CISA advisory guidance is being used in whole or in part as the basis for many states' lists of critical industries that are exempt from shutdown requirements.*

**As of April 17, the CISA guidance now provides broad exemptions for most sign manufacturing, printing, and the distribution of sign and print products. However, the CISA guidance may also restrict some sign installation or electrical service work, limited to allow only work in support of critical infrastructure and essential businesses (like food retailers, pharmacies, gas stations, truck stops, airports, banks, etc).**

(Added 3/28/20) **"This list is advisory in nature. It is not, nor should it be considered, a federal directive or standard. Additionally, this advisory list is not intended to be the exclusive list of critical infrastructure sectors, workers, and functions that should continue during the COVID-19 response across all jurisdictions. Individual jurisdictions should add or subtract essential workforce categories based on their own requirements and discretion."**

CISA Exempted Businesses include:

- **Added 4/17** (Transportation and Logistics) Manufacturers and distributors (to include service centers and related operations) of lighting and communication systems, specialized signage and structural systems, emergency response equipment and support materials, printers, printed materials, packaging materials, pallets, crates, containers, and other supplies needed to support manufacturing, packaging staging and distribution operations, and other critical infrastructure needs.
- **Added 3/28** (Public Works) "Workers such as plumbers, electricians, exterminators, builders, contractors, HVAC Technicians, landscapers, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences, businesses and buildings such as hospitals, senior living facilities, any temporary construction required to support COVID-19 response."
- **Amended 3/28** (Other Government Operations and Essential Functions) "Workers to ensure continuity of building functions, including but not limited to security and environmental controls (e.g., HVAC), the manufacturing and distribution of the products required for these functions, and the permits and inspections for construction supporting essential infrastructure.
- **Added 3/28** (Other Governmental Operations and Essential Functions) "Workers supporting essential maintenance, manufacturing, design, operation, inspection, security, and construction for essential products, services, and supply chain and COVID 19 relief efforts."
- (Critical Manufacturing) "Workers necessary for the manufacturing of materials and products needed for medical supply chains, and for supply chains associated with transportation, energy, communications, food and agriculture, chemical manufacturing, nuclear facilities, the operation of dams, water and



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wastewater treatment, emergency services, and the defense industrial base. Additionally, workers needed to maintain the continuity of these manufacturing functions and associated supply chains.”

## **Alabama**

**On May 21, Gov Ivey amended Alabama's Safer at Home Order to be applied Statewide. The order which includes an expanded list of items to reopen will be effective May 22 and will expire on July 3. During this period, businesses that had previously been closed can reopen under specific guidelines. Employers are required to practice mitigation policies including social distancing and handwashing; face coverings are only required for businesses where staff come into close contact with customers.**

**Gov. Ivey rolled out Alabama's "Safer at home" order which will replace the stay at home order. The safer at home order will be applied Statewide. It will be effective April 30<sup>th</sup> and will expire on Friday, May 22, 2020 at 5:00 p.m** (Announced April 28<sup>th</sup>)

**4. Protections for employees.** Effective May 11, 2020, and unless otherwise permitted or required by this order, all employers shall take reasonable steps, where practicable as work duties permit, to protect their employees by:

- a. maintaining six feet of separation between employees;
- b. regularly disinfecting frequently used items and surfaces;
- c. encouraging handwashing;
- d. preventing employees who are sick from coming into contact with other persons;
- e. facilitating remote working arrangements; and
- f. minimizing employee travel.

**5. Protections for customers, etc.** Effective May 11, 2020, and unless otherwise permitted or required by this order, the operator of any business, government office, or other establishment open to the public shall take reasonable steps, where practicable, to protect their customers, constituents, or other guests by:

- a. maintaining six feet of separation between such persons (except for those persons who share the same household); and
- b. regularly disinfecting frequently used items and surfaces.

**17. Preemption.** To the extent this Order conflicts with any order previously issued by the State Health Officer concerning COVID-19 mitigation measures, this Order supersedes and preempts the conflicting provisions of the previously issued order effective on the dates specified above. This Order also supersedes and preempts all orders



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previously issued by the Jefferson and Mobile County Health Officers concerning COVID-19 mitigation measures, and this Order shall remain in full force and effect until rescinded or modified by order of the State Health Officer or its expiration. After the date this order is issued, the Jefferson and Mobile County Health Officers are authorized, after approval by the State Health Officer, to implement more stringent measures as local circumstances require. This Order also supersedes and preempts any county and municipal orders or ordinances, whenever adopted, that purport to impose less stringent COVID-19-related curfew or quarantine measures.

## **Alaska**

**On May 22, Alaska entered the third phase of its economic reopening which permits all businesses, houses of worship and libraries to reopen, and allows for recreational and sporting activities to open. The 14-day quarantine for interstate and international travel into Alaska will remain in place and be reevaluated on June 2.**

**On May 6, Governor Dunleavy announced the beginning of Phase Two of the Reopening Plan, effective May 8. This phase allows for the reopening of most nonessential businesses, with continued safeguards in place.** <https://gov.alaska.gov/newsroom/2020/05/06/governor-dunleavy-announces-phase-two-of-reopen-alaska-responsibly-plan/>

**On April 24<sup>th</sup>, Governor Dunleavy announced his “Reopen Alaska Responsibly” plan and Health Mandate 16. Activities and businesses that were governed by previous health mandates may resume under the conditions and guidance provided by the mandate. The order pre-empts any local restrictions and requires reopening businesses to practice social distancing, sanitization and other operational limitations in this early phase of the statewide reopening plan.** <https://covid19.alaska.gov/wp-content/uploads/2020/04/COVID-19-Mandate-016.pdf>

## **Arizona**

**On June 17, Gov. Doug Ducey announced that local governments will have the authority to require face masks be worn in public and at essential businesses (MaskUpAZ). The Arizona Department of Health Services has issued an updated guidance allowing local governments to implement mask and face covering policies, and allowing local authorities to tailor mitigation efforts specific to the local public health need.** <https://www.azdhs.gov/preparedness/epidemiology-disease-control/infectious-disease-epidemiology/index.php#novel-coronavirus-mask-up>

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## **California**

**California is currently operating under a partial reopening for manufacturing in much of the state, though some localities have imposed more restrictive orders for businesses.**

**On June 18, Gov. Newsome issued an order for all Californians to wear face coverings while in public or high-risk settings, including when shopping, taking public transit or seeking medical care. The state mandate exempts children 2 years old and younger, and people with a medical, mental health or developmental disability that prevents them from wearing a face covering. Face coverings also are not required for the hearing impaired, or those communicating with them, or for workers whose health may be put at risk or who may need to temporarily remove a mask to perform a task or service.**

**Masks must be worn by Californians in their workplaces when serving customers or any member of the public, by all food service workers, when walking through parking facilities and hallways at work, and when riding on elevators, according to the order. People who drive buses, taxis, ride-hailing vehicles or any other service that accepts passengers also must wear masks.**

**California now is in early Stage 2, where retail, related logistics and manufacturing, office workplaces, limited personal services, outdoor museums, child care, and essential businesses can open with modifications.**

**Stage 2 expansion will be phased in gradually. Some communities may move through Stage 2 faster if able to show greater progress. Counties that have met the readiness criteria and worked with the California Department of Public Health can open more workplaces as outlined on the County Variance page. ## **Colorado**

**Nonessential workers directed to work from home, effective March 26<sup>th</sup> at 6:00am until ~~April 11<sup>th</sup>~~ **April 26<sup>th</sup>**. (Announced March 25<sup>th</sup>)**

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- Strongly encouraging telecommuting where possible
- Require businesses to make work accommodations for vulnerable individuals (and persons living in household with vulnerable individuals)
- Mandatory social distancing and cleaning protocols
- Businesses with 50+ employees at one location follow protocols including temperature checks, cleaning, closure of common areas, etc

## **Connecticut**

**On June 24, the Governors of Connecticut, New York, and New Jersey announced that visitors from states with high coronavirus infection rates must self-quarantine for 14 days on arrival. Those states are Alabama, Arkansas, Arizona, Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, Utah, and Washington.**

**Connecticut is operating under a partial reopening posture beginning May 20, after the expiration of a stay at home order that had first been imposed on March 20.** [https://portal.ct.gov/-/media/DECD/Covid\\_Business\\_Recovery/general-reopen-051920.pdf?la=en](https://portal.ct.gov/-/media/DECD/Covid_Business_Recovery/general-reopen-051920.pdf?la=en)

**Prior to May 20, Gov. Lamont has issued specific guidelines for sectors intending to reopen on that date, including offices and retail locations. Manufacturers are not included in these guidelines, as Connecticut had adopted the federal CISA guidance for “essential” businesses exempt from the previous order. These businesses should continue to operate under guidelines for essential businesses (restated in the FAQ link below). Non-essential businesses looking to restart operations on May 20 should follow the sectorspecific guidance below. **Individuals working at essential businesses in CT must wear face coverings in public, including places of work, when unable to maintain a safe social distance. Employers must issue face coverings to employees, provide them with materials and a CDC tutorial on how to make their own mask, or “compensate employees for the reasonable and necessary costs employees expend on such materials to make their own masks or cloth face covering.” The requirement lasts for the duration of the state of emergency.** (effective April 20<sup>th</sup>)

## Florida

**Florida has entered Phase 1 of “Safe. Smart. Step-by-Step.” reopening plan for Florida’s starting May 4<sup>th</sup>.** [https://www.flgov.com/wp-content/uploads/orders/2020/EO\\_20-112.pdf](https://www.flgov.com/wp-content/uploads/orders/2020/EO_20-112.pdf)

**As of May 15, Florida statewide has entered Phase 1 of “Safe. Smart. Step-by-Step.” reopening plan. The order continues to permit essential businesses under the federal CISA definitions of critical infrastructure, and allows the partial reopening of nonessential retail or in-person businesses at a reduced capacity. Under the most recent order, local municipalities may implement their own stay at home order as they deem appropriate for their communities but shall follow the critical infrastructure workforce guidance.**

## Georgia





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**Governor Kemp announces stay in place order effective April 3<sup>rd</sup> at 6:00pm until ~~April 13<sup>th</sup>~~ **April 30<sup>th</sup>** (Announced April 2<sup>nd</sup>)**

**Gov. Kemp issued an order lifting some stay-at-home requirements beginning April 27<sup>th</sup> for some retail businesses. <https://gov.georgia.gov/document/2020-executive-order/04202001/download>**

**Georgia is currently operating under a state of partial business reopenings that started on April 24. Businesses in Georgia are currently allowed to conduct minimum basic operations at some inperson retail locations in the state. The order continues to exempt from effect of the order essential businesses defined under the federal CISA guidelines. Companies that continue in-person operations are required to implement mitigation efforts, including telework, sanitization and optional health screenings including temperature checks for employees.**

## **Hawaii**

**Beginning in June 1, Hawaii will transitioned to Part 2: Re-opening of the Beyond Recovery: Reopening Hawai'i, four part plan. Manufacturing is open with social distancing and safe practices. Businesses in operation must practice social distancing, maintain separate operating hours for high-risk populations and make "readily available" hand sanitizers and sanitizing products.**

**Gov. Ige will allow the reopening of several nonessential retail businesses beginning May 7. ## **Idaho**

**Governor announces **phased reopening beginning in first half of May****

**Idaho is currently operating under a phased reopening, with its Stay at Home order having expired on April 30. The Stay at Home order was replaced with a Stay Healthy order that went into effect on May 1; this order allows for businesses to resume business operations at physical locations but requires the maintenance of social distancing and sanitation practices.**

**Idaho entered Stage 3 of Reopening on May 30<sup>th</sup>.**

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## **Illinois**

Illinois is currently operating under a stay at home order Phase 3 that lasts through May 30. Gov Pritzker announced Sunday, May 24 the Phase 3 executive order and guidelines for opening to be signed early this week. Requirements for manufacturers. Manufacturers must ensure all employees practice social distancing and must take appropriate additional public health precautions, in accordance with DCEO guidance, which include:

- provide face coverings to all employees who are not able to maintain a minimum six-foot social distance at all times;
- ensure that all spaces where employees may gather, including locker rooms and lunchrooms, allow for social distancing; and
- modify and downsize operations (staggering shifts, reducing line speeds, operating only essential lines, while shutting down non-essential lines) to the extent necessary to allow for social distancing and to provide a safe workplace in response to the COVID-19 emergency.

Gov. Pritzker announced the “Restore Illinois Plan” outlining five phases to reopen the state. Page 4 highlights the phases. Per the governor, Illinois is currently in Phase 2 statewide, with a goal of moving toward Phase 3 – which allows for the reopening of “non-essential” manufacturing businesses – possibly on a regional basis beginning May 29<sup>th</sup>.

## **Indiana**

Gov. Holcomb announced a Phase 3: Back on Track Guidance for the State of Indiana currently (as of June 1) operating at a statewide Phase 3. The entire order is set to expire June 13. Manufacturing was permitted in Phase 2 and “Guidelines for Manufacturing” were provided with health and safety protocols regarding social distancing, employee checks and overall safety.

Gov. Holcomb announced a Phase 2: Back on Track Guidance for the State of Indiana to go into effect on May 4<sup>th</sup>, allowing for manufacturing facilities that are not currently open to resume work. Note there is a “Guidelines for Manufacturing” document that provides protocols regarding social distancing, employee checks and overall safety. The following counties will remain in a Stay at Home order: Lake, Marion and Cass.

Governor announces stay at home order effective March 24<sup>th</sup> at 11:59pm (Announced March 23<sup>rd</sup>); Expires May 1<sup>st</sup>

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## **Kansas**

Governor Kelly implementing phase 1 “Ad-Astra: A Plan to Reopen KANSAS” on May 4<sup>th</sup>; Governor Kelly issues statewide stay-at-home order until ~~April 19<sup>th</sup>~~ **May 3<sup>rd</sup>** (Announced March 28<sup>th</sup>); Earlier order establishes Kansas Essential Functions Framework for local stay-at-home orders (Announced March 24<sup>th</sup>)

**Gov. Kelly announced the state will move to Phase 2 of the Reopening Kansas plan starting Friday May 22. Manufacturing is open with social distancing and safe practice guidelines.**

## **Kentucky**

Governor announced closure of non-essential businesses effective March 26<sup>th</sup> (Announced March 25<sup>th</sup>);

**Governor Beshear recently announced that manufacturers who had been designated as nonessential will be allowed to reopen and reboot operations on May 11<sup>th</sup> provided the following guidelines can be met: Continue telework where possible; Phased return to work; Onsite temperature/health checks; Universal masks and other necessary PPE; Close common areas; Enforce social distancing; Limit face-to-face meetings; Sanitizer/hand wash stations; Special accommodations; Testing plan. Governor Beshear's office has released requirements for continuing business and reopening manufacturing, distribution, and supply chain businesses beginning May 11<sup>th</sup>. 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practices such as face coverings in places where social distancing is not possible. The order restates specific requirements for manufacturers, including those listed below.

Beginning on May 7, companies may deploy workers to engage in start-up activities at facilities. Workers performing either start-up activities or resumed activities, a number of safety protocols for companies are required, including (but not limited to):

- Conducting daily entry screening protocols for workers and facility visitors, including temperature screening
- Requiring face coverings for workers who cannot consistently maintain safe social distancing
- Create dedicated entry points for screenings
- Suspend non-essential visits to the facility
- Train workers in a number of different ways on safety and mitigation
- Closing common areas where practicable
- Institute staggered shift starts and break times where practicable
- Installing temporary barriers where practicable and deploying sanitization including handwashing stations and disinfecting protocols

Manufacturing work is not permitted to resume until companies have implemented protocols specified by the order.

**On May 19, Gov. DeWine announced that the Ohio Health Department Director is signing a new Urgent Health Advisory: Ohioans Protecting Ohioans, which rescinds and maintains portions of the Stay Safe Ohio order (see links below). The advisory will move from orders to strong recommendations. The advisory incorporates all the business orders about social distancing and sanitation, including employees wearing masks, as well as efforts to protect employees and efforts to protect the public. While the orders have included limited travel restrictions, these will now be lifted. However, while unnecessary travel within or outside of the state of Ohio is still permitted, it is not encouraged.**

South Carolina’s order affects RETAIL businesses, with limited effects on other businesses

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**Governor Lee issued order implementing stay-at-home guidelines in every county effective from March 31<sup>st</sup> until April 14<sup>th</sup> April 30<sup>th</sup>** (announced March 30<sup>th</sup>, extended April 13<sup>th</sup>); **Governor amends earlier order now requiring stay-at-home instead of earlier “guidelines”** (announced April 2<sup>nd</sup>)

**On April 28, Gov. Lee issued an executive order to lift Tennessee’s statewide stay at home order and impose new mitigation requirements for businesses in the state. Tennesseans and businesses are permitted to return to work in all industries where that can be safely accomplished by following health guidelines. All employers and businesses that choose to open are expected to comply with the Governor’s Economic Recovery Group (ERG) Guidelines for operating safely, as well as general health guidelines from the CDC and other government entities.** Does not apply in Shelby, Madison, Davidson, Hamilton, Knox and Sullivan counties — where the governor said he would work with local public health officials to indicate their own reopening strategies.

## Texas

**On June 25, Gov. Abbott announced a pause its reopening process and moved to free up hospital space for virus patients. He issued an executive order suspending elective procedures in hospitals in four counties (Bexar, Dallas, Harris, and Travis counties). ## **Vermont**

On May 29, Governor Scott announced the opening of additional business operations and increased permissible social gathering sizes, made possible by state data modeling showing a continued low number of COVID-19 cases in the state. This announcement was accompanied by updated safety guidance from the Agency of Commerce and Community Development.

Effective May 11<sup>th</sup>, any manufacturing facilities that had ceased operations for more than seven days during the state of emergency may reopen with as few employees as necessary to permit full operations while maintaining compliance with mandatory health and safety requirements. <https://governor.vermont.gov/press-release/governor-phil-scott-announces-additional-economic-re-opening-steps>

On May 15, Governor Scott extending the state of emergency to expire on June 15. The order also made modifications to his previous Stay Home, Stay Safe Order to encourage Vermonters to only travel as needed and to maintain social distancing and follow CDC hygiene recommendations. ## **Virginia**

Governor Northam announced stay-at-home order from March 30<sup>th</sup> until June 10<sup>th</sup>

On May 8, Governor Northam announced Phase One guidelines for easing public health restrictions will go into effect on May 15. As of May 29, the entirety of the commonwealth has entered Phase One.

Phase One permits retail establishments to operate at 50% capacity, allows bars and restaurants to permit outdoor seating at 50%, and provides for the reopening of personal services businesses. Health and safety best practices and recommendations for all business sectors are included with the order, though no new requirements announced specific to manufacturing.

On May 26, Governor Northam signed an executive order requiring the wearing of face coverings in all public indoor settings, effective on May 29.

On May 4, Governor Northam outlined his three-phase plan to ease restrictions on businesses and public gatherings when public health data supports doing so.

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## **West Virginia**

Governor Justice announced stay-at-home order effective for businesses from March 24<sup>th</sup> (announced March 23<sup>rd</sup>) Governor Justice issued executive order directing travelers from hot spots into 14-day quarantine, exempting commercial activity and essential business (announced March 30<sup>th</sup>)

On April 27, Gov. Justice issued West Virginia's "West Virginia Strong – The Comeback" Plan for partial reopening, including stages for relaxed restrictions on different business types and sizes. The Week 1 phase of reopening's will begin on Thursday, April 30. From there, each phase of the reopening process for Weeks 2-6 will begin on Monday of each subsequent week. Governor Evers issued a stay in place order that closes all nonessential businesses from March 25<sup>th</sup> until April 24<sup>th</sup> May 26<sup>th</sup>, with exceptions for Manufacturers (announced March 24<sup>th</sup>)

Wisconsin had been operating under a stay at home order through May 26 until the state Supreme Court struck down the order on May 13. ISA is working to understand the impact of the ruling in the state. News reports have indicated some inperson retail businesses like bars or restaurants reopened shortly after the ruling. It's not clear what steps Gov. Evers, the state legislature, or local governing authorities may take in the absence of a statewide order.

Gov. Evers has issued a "Badger Bounce Back" plan that outlines different phases of reopening for Wisconsin and how business conditions in the state might change, but none of that plan has yet been implemented.
